Welcome to the New Jersey Seal of Biliteracy Newsletter!

The Seal of Biliteracy is a national initiative that recognizes bilingual and multilingual students graduating from participating high school districts. In 2016, New Jersey became the 17th state to implement the State Seal of Biliteracy. Since then, over 3,579 students spanning 120 districts and 20 counties in New Jersey have been awarded the Seal at graduation.

The New Jersey Department of Education is collaborating with Rutgers Graduate School of Education to support participating districts that award the Seal of Biliteracy, as well as those new to the program who plan on participating in 2019. We also plan to share your stories to document students' and districts' multilingual achievements.

In our newsletters, you will find useful information about upcoming professional development opportunities; stories highlighting students, schools, and districts, and procedures for implementing the Seal of Biliteracy. Enjoy

to meet the established criteria for the Seal. In our first year, we allowed 11th graders to meet the criteria through their world language AP exam and PARCC and PSAT scores. Then last year, our second year, we had great support from our administration in order to pay for the STAMP exam for interested students. This allowed us to offer the Seal to 11th and 12th graders who are interested in and met the criteria. In 2018, 64 students received the Seal for their proficiency in English and these languages: Spanish, Italian, Hindi, French and Chinese. This year, we already have 44 students who have qualified for the Seal and we plan to continue testing again in late January/early February.

Q: How do you promote the program?

Working with our Director of Curriculum, we send email blasts to the students and parents and guardians in our community to let them know about this opportunity. Our World Language teachers also share information with their students about the exam. However, we don't mandate the exam. Students can self-nominate with the hope of earning the Seal. We hold information sessions in our high schools where we provide a presentation with an overview of the program

and how to apply, and to introduce them to the STAMP assessment so they become acclimated with the exam [[Click here](#) for a list of accepted assessments].

Q: Do you have any advice for districts new to offering the Seal?

There are a few things I would suggest:

1. Make sure your administration is on board and supportive of the assessments;
2. Find a good time of year to administer the assessments; and
3. Ensure you have technical infrastructure and support for the assessments.

In our case, we have strong administrative support. Because the state needs the scores by March, we opted to test at the end of January or early February. In order to make the process manageable, it is really helpful to have the assistance of an assessment coordinator or a teacher, as it does require coordination with schedules and enough time to proctor.

Q: What is your vision regarding offering the Seal in your district?

We are all about providing as many opportunities as possible to showcase our students

It has been very exciting working with students who earn two seals. We have students who are demonstrating that they're trilingual!
